Founded by Cheryl McCloud, Lake Haven is a volunteer, non-profit organization (501c3), dedicated to the care and adoption of homeless and/or injured dogs, cats, kittens, and puppies. Lake Haven is currently established as an independent, private shelter.

#### A NEW BEGINNING FOR LAKE HAVEN

This was the year that Lake Haven chose to begin the "Low-Cost Spay/Neuter Program that has been a life-long dream of it's director and founder, Cheryl McCloud. "I've always wanted to initiate a program to benefit animals, a program that could sustain itself. Newaygo County Commissioners agreed with the components of our program and have jumped on board in supporting the success of this program by approving a monetary grant to Lake Haven.

To date, Lake Haven has spayed/ neutered 65 animals. Credit must go to the veterinarians that are assisting with the program: Dr. Sam Cialto of White Cloud, Dr. Lepley of Howard City, Dr. Gilbert of Pleasant View Pet Hospital of Big Rapids, and C-SNIP of Grand Rapids.

Lake Haven hopes to spay/ neuter a minimum of 200 animals per year in addition to the 1,600+ animals a year that we place into adoptive homes.

We are doing our best to educate and actively participate in the slowing of the rate of companion animal overpopulation. Simply put, there are not enough homes for the numbers of animals born today.



According to the American Humane organization, only 25% of dogs and 24% of cats entering

animal shelters are ever adopted, with 56% of dogs and 71% of cats euthanized. The HSUS estimates 3-4 MILLION cats and dogs are euthanized every year in the U.S. Tremendous as the problem of pet overpopulation is, it can be solved if each of us takes just one small step, starting with not allowing our animals to breed.

Please spread the word of the importance of spay/neuter to family, friends, and neighbors. Education is the key, as many are not aware of the existence of the pet overpopulation problem.



#### TIPS FOR KEEPING YOUR PET SAFE THIS CHRISTMAS

Here are some tips for keeping your pets out of danger during the holiday season. AVOID Holiday Food Items That Could Cause Problems For Your Pet

- Alcoholic beverages
- Chocolate (baker's, semi-sweet, milk chocolate)
- Coffee (grounds, beans, chocolate covered espresso beans)
- Moldy or spoiled foods
- Onions, onion powder
- Fatty foods
- Salt
- Yeast dough

#### **PLANTS**

- Lilies that may be found in holiday flower arrangements could be deadly to your cat. Many types of lily, such as Tiger, Asian, Japanese Show, Easter, Stargazer, and the Casa Blanca, can cause kidney failure in cats.
- **Poinsettias** are generally over-rated in toxicity. If ingested, poinsettias can be irritating to the mouth and stomach, and may cause mild vomiting or nausea.
- **Mistletoe** has the potential to cause cardiovascular problems. However, mistletoe ingestion usually only causes gastrointestinal upset.
- Holly ingestion could cause vomiting, nausea, diarrhea, and lethargy.

#### HAZARDS AROUND THE CHRISTMAS TREE

- Christmas tree water may contain fertilizers, which, if ingested, can cause stomach upset. Stagnant tree water can be breeding grounds for bacteria, which can also lead to vomiting, nausea, and diarrhea, if ingested.
- Electric cords- Avoid animal exposure to electric cords. If they were chewed, they could electrocute your pet. Cover up or hide electric cords, never let your pet chew on them.
- Ribbons or tinsel can get caught up in the intestines and cause intestinal obstruction.
- Batteries contain corrosives. If ingested they can cause ulceration to the mouth, tongue, and the rest of the gastrointestinal tract.
- Glass ornaments can cut the tissues of the gastrointestinal tract if ingested.
   MEDICATIONS

**Keep** all prescriptions and over-the-counter drugs out of the reach of your pets, preferably in closed cabinets. Pain killers, cold medicines, anti-cancer, drugs, anti-depressants, vitamins, and diet pills are common examples of human medication that could be potentially lethal even in small dosages. One

regular-strength ibuprofen tablet (200mg) can cause stomach ulcers in a 10-pound

dog. Remind holiday guests to store their medications safely as well. During the holidays, many veterinary clinics have limited office hours. In some cases, pet owners try to medicate their animals without their veterinarian's advice. **Never** give your animal any medications unless under the directions of veterinarian. Many medications that are used safely in humans can be deadly when used inappropriately. Less than one regular strength acetaminophen tablet (325mg) can be dangerous to a cat weighing 7lbs.

Each day, 10,000 humans are born in the U.S., and each day 70,000 puppies and kittens are born. As long as these birth rates exist, there will never be enough homes for all the animals. As a result, every year 4 to 6 million animals are euthanized simply because there are no homes for them. Every puppy/kitten born and adopted equals one less home for a shelter dog or cat who's very life depends upon finding a home. Don't breed or buy—while these wonderful

companions in shelters and rescues die. They are the innocent victims. If you've adopted from Lake Haven or any other shelter, you are well aware of what wonderful companions these animals are.
